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**Craig Waldman**, counsel for both Adobe Systems Incorporated and Siebel Systems, Inc. in their respective multi-billion dollar transactions, is a partner in the Antitrust & Trade Regulation practice group and a member of the Cooley Godward Kronish Litigation department. A former attorney with the Federal Trade Commission, Mr. Waldman was named to *The International Who's Who of Competition Lawyers 2007*. His practice focuses on antitrust matters in domestic and cross-border contexts, including work in areas such as mergers, agreements among competitors, vertical distribution issues, price discrimination, criminal antitrust matters, intellectual property licensing and trade regulation.

Throughout his career, in his business advisory role, Mr. Waldman has counseled numerous global corporations across several industries including hardware and software, B2B electronic platforms, defense, sports, financial markets, biotech, retail stores and telecommunications.

At the FTC, Mr. Waldman led numerous merger and non-merger investigations. Following his time at the FTC, he was an associate at Rogers & Wells prior to that firm's merger with Clifford Chance, where he became partner.

Mr. Waldman has also authored several papers and articles, including "A Practical Guide to the JV Guidelines" and "LePage's v. 3M: Now Where Are We Regarding Bundled Rebate Programs?" He was a contributor to the *Premerger Coordination: The Emerging Law of Gun Jumping and Information Exchange*.

Mr. Waldman has been a speaker at several preeminent antitrust conferences, including the CBI Conference in London where he spoke on "Competition and Innovation: The Development of High Tech Companies - The U.S. Antitrust Experience" and the California Lawyer Antitrust Roundtable. He has also lectured on antitrust at Stanford Graduate School of Business, U.C. Hastings College of the Law and Foothill College.
