Bruce McDonald is a partner in the Washington, D.C., and Houston, Texas, antitrust practices of Jones Day. He has antitrust merger and litigation experience in energy, transportation, and telecommunications industries.

From 2003 to 2007, Bruce served as a deputy assistant attorney general in the U.S. Department of Justice, where his responsibilities included civil antitrust enforcement in airlines, energy, telecommunications, and health care matters. In 2005, the Attorney General appointed Bruce to serve as the DOJ's representative on the Electric Energy Competition Task Force created by Congress in the Energy Policy Act of 2005. He was also part of the U.S. delegation that negotiated the "open skies" agreement signed in 2007 by the U.S. and the European Union.

Bruce has testified before committees of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives and speaks and writes frequently on antitrust law enforcement and policy. He taught antitrust and trade regulation as an adjunct professor at the University of Houston Law Center. He is a member of the Supreme Court bar, the State Bar of Texas, the District of Columbia Bar, and the American Bar Association (vice chair of the Antitrust Section's Fuel & Energy Committee). He has been active in many bar association activities, in 2007 was elected to the Council of the Texas Bar's Antitrust and Business Litigation Section, and has served as chairman of the Houston Bar Association Antitrust Section.

Bruce attended The University of Texas at Austin (B.A. with honors 1985; J.D. with honors 1988; Order of the Coif; Managing Editor, *The Review of Litigation*) and the University of London (Course work in Public International Law and European Competition Law 1997).
