

Jan Goldman-Carter is a solo practice environmental lawyer focusing primarily on wetlands and water quality issues for environmental groups. Ms. Goldman-Carter represents the National Wildlife Federation and other environmental groups on national, regional, and state wetlands issues, and was in-house counsel for fisheries and wildlife at the National Wildlife Federation in Washington, D.C. from 1987-1991. Her national and regional wetlands work has included wetlands litigation, legislation, and administrative matters. She has lectured and written extensively on federal wetlands laws and regulations.

Ms. Goldman-Carter is also an active board member of the Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy (MCEA), and the chair of the MCEA Board's Legal Committee. She has represented MCEA in several Minnesota legislative and administrative wetland matters in a pro bono capacity.

Ms. Goldman-Carter taught Environmental Law at University of Indiana-Indianapolis Law School as adjunct faculty member in 1992 and is currently teaching Environmental Law at the University of St. Thomas Law School. She received the 1993 Environmental Protection Agency-Environmental Law Institute National Wetlands Award. Prior to becoming a lawyer, Jan worked on wetlands conservation issues as a biologist with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and the U.S. Corps of Engineers. Jan received her B.A. in Biology and Environmental Studies from Williams College, Massachusetts, her M.S. in Natural Resources from the University of Michigan School of Natural Resources, and her law degree from the University of Minnesota.
