

Andrew Schoenholtz

Andrew I. Schoenholtz is the Deputy Director of Georgetown University's Institute for the Study of International Migration (ISIM). He also co-directs the Certificate Program in Refugee and Humanitarian Emergencies, open to Masters level students at the University.

Dr. Schoenholtz conducts studies on a range of international migration matters, including the causes and potential responses to population movements, immigration and refugee law and policy, comparative migration, the integration of immigrants into their host societies, and the effects of international migration on social relations, economics, demographics, foreign policy and national security. Dr. Schoenholtz has conducted fact-finding missions in Haiti, Cuba, Germany, Croatia, Bosnia, Malawi, and Zambia to study root causes, refugee protection, long-term solutions to mass migration emergencies, and humanitarian relief operations. Within the United States, his research has focused on immigrant homeownership; asylum; and the impact of security measures on legal immigration.

Dr. Schoenholtz also teaches courses on Refugee Law and Policy, Human Rights and Humanitarian Crises, and Immigration Law and Policy. He also coordinates an educational and research partnership with three East African University forced migration centers. Before coming to Georgetown, he served as Deputy Director of the U.S. Commission on Immigration Reform and practiced immigration, asylum and international law with the Washington, D.C. law firm of Covington & Burling.

Dr. Schoenholtz' publications include: *The State of Asylum Representation: Ideas for Change* (co-authored with Jonathan Jacobs); *Reaching the Immigrant Market: Creating Homeownership Opportunities for New Americans* (co-authored with Kristin Stanton); *Transatlantic Dialogue on Terrorism and International Migration*; *Asylum in Practice: Success, Failures, and the Challenges Ahead* (co-authored with Susan Martin); *Aiding and Abetting Persecutors: The Seizure and Return of Haitian Refugees in Violation of the U.N. Refugee Convention and Protocol*; and *Temporary Protection: Towards a New Regional and Domestic Framework* (co-authored with Susan Martin and Deborah Meyers). Dr. Schoenholtz holds a J.D. from Harvard Law School and a Ph.D. from Brown University.
