

Karen T. Grisez is Special Counsel for Public Service resident in Fried Frank, Harris, Shriver & Jacobson's Washington, DC office. In her role as Public Service Counsel, Ms. Grisez manages the intake and placement of pro bono matters, acts as liaison to national and local bar associations and legal services providers and provides substantive advice and assistance to other attorneys in the traditional *pro bono* practice areas. Her areas of interest include political asylum and other immigration matters, veterans' benefits, family law, landlord/tenant and general civil litigation. Ms. Grisez is a Commissioner to the American Bar Association's Commission on Immigration and was the former co-chair of the Immigration Litigation Committee of the ABA Section of Litigation. She is a member of the Board of Trustees of the American Immigration Law Foundation, the Board of Directors of the Capital Area Immigrants' Rights Coalition and the Washington Council of Lawyers. She also chairs the Advisory Committee on Pro Se Litigation of the United States District Court for the District of Columbia. Ms. Grisez is a frequent speaker and panelist on asylum and other immigration-related topics, including federal court litigation in the immigration context.

Ms. Grisez received her JD in 1990 from Catholic University of America, Columbus School of Law, where she was lead articles editor of the Law Review, as well as a member of the Moot Court Board and winner of the Alumni Achievement Award for most outstanding combination of academics and extracurricular activities, and her BA, *summa cum laude*, in 1987 from the University of Maryland.
