MAINE LAWYER RECEIVES PURSUIT OF JUSTICE AWARD

CHICAGO, September 29, 2004— The American Bar Association Tort Trial & Insurance Practice Section (TIPS) today announced that it will award a Pursuit of Justice Award to Maine attorney Daniel G. Lilley, of Daniel G. Lilley Law Offices in Portland, Maine. The award will be presented during the 2004 TIPS Fall meeting at the Task Force for Plaintiff's Involvement Reception, from 5:30 – 6:30 pm on Friday, Oct. 8, at the Samoset Resort, Rockport, Maine.

The Pursuit of Justice Award is awarded quarterly to recognize civil litigation attorneys who have shown outstanding merit and excelled at ensuring access to justice.

Lilley is the managing attorney and president of Daniel G. Lilley Law Offices. He graduated in 1964 from the University of Maine at Orono with a BA in History and Government. He received his JD from Boston University Law School in 1967. Lilley began his practice of law as an Assistant Attorney General before opening his law practice in 1969. He has become widely recognized as one of Maine's preeminent trial attorneys, and has been cited in *Best Lawyers in America* from 1986 to the present.
