

## AMELIA H. BOSS

Amelia H. Boss (also known as Amy), a graduate of Bryn Mawr College and Rutgers Camden Law School, is a Professor of Law at Temple University School of Law, where she teaches in the commercial law, bankruptcy and electronic commerce areas and serves as the director of the Institute of Law and Public Policy. Amy is a member of the ABA House of Delegates and is a former member of the ABA Commission on Women. She is a past chair of the Section Officers Conference of the American Bar Association, past chair of the ABA Business Law Section, and former chair of the ABA Uniform Commercial Code Committee. She is a member of the Permanent Editorial Board of the Uniform Commercial Code and a member of the Council of the American Law Institute where she serves on its Executive Committee. Amy is a fellow of the American College of Commercial Financial Lawyers, a fellow of the American Bar foundation, a member of the American Bankruptcy Institute, and a member of the Board of Directors of the Institute of International Commercial Law. She has served as an advisor and as the United States Delegate to the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law (UNCITRAL) on issues relating to electronic commerce and has worked with the United Nations Commission on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) and the Asian Pacific Economic Cooperation Council (APEC) on issues involving electronic commerce. She is a Correspondent to the International Institute for the Unification of Private Law (UNIDROIT) in Rome. She is the former Editor-in-Chief of THE BUSINESS LAWYER, and is the editor of the book series, ABCS OF THE UCC, published by the American Bar Association. She is the recipient of the ABA Cyberspace Law Excellence Award (2004); Philadelphia Bar Association Dennis Replansky Memorial Award (2000); Rutgers Law School Armitage Award (1999); Friel-Scanlon Faculty Scholarship Award, 1994; and the ABA Business Law Glasscutter Award (1995). In 1998, she was ranked by THE NATIONAL LAW JOURNAL as one of the fifty most influential women attorneys in the United States. Amy has taught in New Zealand, China, Japan, Italy, Ireland and Austria.
